## Message from the Principal

Good afternoon everyone,

It has been a busy term and it seems surreal that term one is almost over. The tone throughout the school is generally positive and many students are achieving extremely good academic results.

### School Board:

The School Board conducted its Annual General Meeting on Wednesday, 29th March. This meeting was well attended and I would like to congratulate the members who were elected/nominated to this year's Board. I'd like to congratulate Rebecca Baker who was elected unopposed as the Board's continuing Chair for 2017. All positions on the School Board have now been filled and this is a wonderful result for our school community. The Board oversees the school's transformational plan, financial management, policy development, and performance and improvement.

### Attendance:

Term 1 attendance is still well below expectations for many students. Please ensure that:

1. Your child is at school EVERYDAY
2. You tell us why your child was absent from school
3. You respond to any SMS attendance notifications sent to your phone

We need all parents to make their children's attendance at school their highest priority. This is a legal responsibility and DECD has begun prosecuting parents would deliberately allow their children to remain absent from school. If you need support with any attendance matters, please contact our Student Engagement and Wellbeing team.



### IT and BYOD Program:

Our staff and students are about to experience the first major update to the school's curriculum network since it became wireless in 2008. In effect, we are about to switch to the National Broad Band (NBN) network using fibre optic cabling as opposed to copper telephone network. This investment will cost our school more than \$40,000 per year but we give staff and students lightning speed access to online learning and internet access. To date, approximately 550 students have purchased their own learning device and it has been great to see these in use around the school. However, this still leaves approximately half of our students without access to their own electronic device such as a laptop. If your child still does not have their own laptop, it is now urgent that you work with the school to provide them with one. Brand new laptops for only \$100 per year or 2nd hand laptops for only \$50 per year are available through the school. Payment can be made using Centrepay. Please contact us about our student laptop program.

### 2016 Annual Report:

At the AGM, the school's 2016 Annual Report was tabled and discussed. Both the standard DECD and a more extensive school version of the Annual Report are now accessible on the school's website. [www.playford.sa.edu.au](http://www.playford.sa.edu.au)

### Crockerton Road Gates:

This term, we have had several unauthorised parents and community members enter the school grounds without permission. In some cases, teachers have even been confronted in classrooms whilst teaching. Can I please remind all parents that you are not permitted to enter the school grounds without permission. If you wish to see a member of staff or your child, please report to the Client or School Services in the first instance. To further improve school security and safety, the Crockerton entrance gate will be closed during the school day from the start of Term 2. This gate will close at the start of Learning Block 1 (9.10am) and will be reopen at the end of the school day in time for students to exit the school grounds. Access to the school during the day is available through the front entrance via Philip Highway.

#### School Attendance

Research shows that poor school attendance is associated with:

- lower academic achievement including literacy and numeracy
- early school leaving
- leaving school with fewer qualifications
- reduced opportunities for students to learn and access educational resources, further limiting achievement
- further absenteeism in higher year levels
- increased incidence of negative impact on health and wellbeing.

Our own data strongly supports these research findings. In order for students to be as successful as possible it is essential that they attend school every day that they are well enough to do so. It is also a legal responsibility of parents to ensure their child's regular attendance at school. DECD has recently launched prosecutions for failure to ensure regular attendance at school. Please contact the school if you would like to discuss strategies to help support your child's attendance.

#### School uniform – why is it important?

Safety—through conforming with a full school uniform safety is reinforced as intruders are much more easily identified.

No one gets singled out— uniforms help reduce social issues.

Professionalism—commitment to uniform helps develop organisational skill, responsibility and self-discipline within students. These are key skills required in the workforce.

#### Correct current contact details

It is extremely important that the school has up-to-date details for parents, carers and emergency contact individuals. Please remember to inform the school when any of these details change. This is especially important if a student is injured.

#### Traffic safety

Please encourage safe behaviour in relation to abiding by road rules and using designated pedestrian crossing points in the vicinity of the school.

## Senior School Report

With Term 1 rapidly coming to a close SACE teachers are about to close their marks books and begin to write Term 1 reports. These progress reports are very important because whether your son/daughter is in Year 11 or 12 any grade below a 'C' indicates that learning and a successful outcome is at risk. Students are settling in well to the new timetable structure but the new focus needs to be on maximising their own time. This has been the key focus of the Senior Seminar Series, where positive mindsets, prioritising, having a purpose and minimising distractions have been addressed and workshopped with students. Making these habitual changes will lead to success while studying the SACE. Students should also remember that the Senior Centre is open from 8am – 9am every morning for accelerated learning. This is another opportunity students can maximise study time in peace and quiet.

Senior students have also undertaken a survey called the 'Senior School Pathways Survey'. The intention of this survey was to collate as much data as possible and paint a picture about where each senior wants to head post high school. Some amazing data came out of the survey, for example, 64% of seniors surveyed indicating that they are aspiring to receive an ATAR. This goes to show how the culture of the school is changing and that students want to achieve a successful future post high school. Another statistic showed that just over 50% of students said they would do everything in their power to leave Playford International College with a TAFE course, traineeship, apprenticeship, or full time work. Mr Hubbard and Mr Crowhurst are the two staff members that make up the school's Pathways Team and they are making sure that they meet with all of these students to see how we can make each student's successful transition from school to their desired pathway a reality.

In week 11, Mrs Van Zyl (Year 12 YLM), is taking a group of students to the Adelaide Tertiary and Careers Expo at the Convention Centre in the city. This is a wonderful opportunity for seniors to meet tertiary students, ask questions about courses and university life and get a taste of the wide range of options available to them in South Australia.

Educating senior students about life is also a theme that will be covered in the Senior Seminar Series this year, and the Year 11 cohort had their first experience of that in week 8. They participated in the Road Awareness Program (RAP) run by the SA Fire Brigade. The messages about road safety, whether you are driving or not, are very powerful and really do expose students to the seriousness of what can happen if you engage in poor behaviour on the roads. The Year 11s actively participated in the session and all walked away being a safer roader user I am sure. Thank you to Ms Quinton (Year 11 YLM) for arranging the session.

### Attention Parents

If you have not already done so, please visit the school's parent portal of DayMap via the school's website. This is a great source of information regarding your son/daughter's attendance, achievement and homework. All students were graded at the end of week 5 via the whole-school Traffic Light system. Students were rated as; Outstanding, On Track, At Risk/Monitor Closely or Requires

Immediate Attention. This gives a great snapshot of student achievement in the click of a button. Another reminder that every senior student starts school at 9:10am and finishes at;

2:50pm on Mondays

3:30pm on Tuesdays

1:50pm on Wednesdays for home study, which they must sign out.  
Or 2:50pm if they choose to stay and study onsite

3:30pm on Thursdays, and

3:30pm on Fridays

Lastly, with the change of seasons upon us the weather is about to get cooler. Now is great time to double check that your son/daughter has a full kit of the school's uniform to keep them warm during winter. From the beginning of Term 2 senior students that refuse to follow the school's loan uniform policy will be required report to R7 at lunch time. Repeat offenders will attract a higher consequence.






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## Special Interest Music Centre 2017

## Student Pathways

Students at Playford Interanational College are given a wide varity of Vocational Education and Traning Options. This year at Playford International College we are running Certificate I and II in Automotive, Certificate III in Business, Certificate II in Food Processing, and Certificate III in Game Development Fundamentals, not only to Playford International College students but also to students in our NASSSA region. Meanwhile within the Music curriculum we are running Certificate II and III in Music, and a SAASTA Program which incorporates Certificate III in Sport & Recreation.

We also have students leaving the school one day a week to complete certificates and competencies in Animal Studies, Community Services, Construction, Driving Operations, Early Childhood Education and Care, Electrotechnology, Engineering, Fitness, Kitchen Operations, Hospitality, Directions in Hair and Beauty, Hairdressing Pathways, Make-Up, Retails Cosmetics, Salon Assistance, Health Services Assistance, Individual Support (Ageing), Information, Digital Media and Technology and Tourism.

A major highlight for this year so far has been the Game Development course. Since offering the Game Development course it has been evident that there is great interest in computer coding both at Playford International College and across the schools in the region. This year it has been amazing to see the interest shown by the students in this class. Mr Cini is the Teacher / Trainer for this course and he has been kept busy. These students regularly arrive and start work half an hour before the official start time, work through their Recess and Lunch breaks, and often stay behind after the end of the day to complete their work. This is a clear measure of their enthusiasm and engagement in the course. Put simply, they love it. Their enthusiasm is inspiring and we are looking forward to see how much they learn and achieve this year, as we are with all of our VET students.
